## Institutional Security Policies and Crimes Statistics

**Welcome!** On behalf of the University of Houston-Victoria and the Campus Safety Office, we are pleased to welcome you into our campus community. The University has always been committed to providing a safe and secure campus and does its utmost to ensure an environment that is safe for studying, working, or visiting. Because knowledge is so important please familiarize yourself with the information in the Campus Crime and Security Report. You will learn about campus crime statistics, campus safety and security policies and procedures. The Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act is the landmark federal law, originally known as the Campus Security Act that requires colleges and universities across the United States to disclose information about crime on and around their campuses. Schools must publish an annual report disclosing campus security policies and three years of selected crime statistics. The University uses the Handbook for Campus Crime Reporting in the preparation of the report. ### Preparing the Annual Campus Crime and Security Report

The UHV Campus Safety Office compiles and publishes the annual security report by October 1<sup>st</sup> of each year. The Campus Safety and Risk Manager compiles statistics from the Victoria Police Department for the University of Houston-Victoria Campus and from the University of Houston Department of Public Safety (UHDPS) Police Department for the University of Houston System at Cinco Ranch and the University of Houston System at Sugar Land. Also, reportable incidents in Safety Office files will be included if they have not been included in the police statistics.

### Summary of Criminal Offenses 2008 Calendar Year

#### UH-Victoria, UHS at Cinco Ranch and UHS at Sugar Land

For the 2008 calendar year, for On Campus, Noncampus and Public Property, geographic locations there were:

- no murders or manslaughter reported;
- no sex offenses of any type reported;
- no hate crimes of any type reported;
- no robberies reported;
- no aggravated assaults reported;
- no motor vehicle thefts reported;
- no arson reported;
- one burglary reported on campus;
- two arrests for drug law violations and one for liquor law violations on public property that is within the campus, or immediately adjacent to and accessible from the campus reported;
- no disciplinary actions referrals for illegal weapons possession, drug law violations, or liquor law violations reported.

Complete and detailed campus crime statistics for UH-Victoria, UHS at Cinco Ranch and UHS at Sugar Land are provided in this report.

# Campus Crime and Security Report

## Your Role

### Personal and community safety begins with personal responsibility.

Whether you are a student or an employee, you must assume an active role in your own safety and the safety of the campus community. Learn to be observant and aware of your surroundings. If you notice suspicious activity or observe a crime, make mental notes of circumstances, descriptions, and times. Do not hesitate to call Emergency Assistance 911 or Campus Security at your respective location. Do not assume someone else has reported the incident.

If you are a student...

1. Think about how you might respond to various situations. The less vulnerable you appear to be, the less likely you will be the victim of a crime.
2. Never leave purses, laptop computers, PDA devices, cell phones or books unattended. If stolen, they are almost never recovered.
3. If driving, always lock your vehicle and never leave valuables in plain sight. If attending night classes, try to park in lighted areas. Have your car keys out when you return to your vehicle and check the front and back seats before entering. If you feel unsafe walking alone back to your car at night, walk with a group or call Security and ask for an escort to your vehicle.
4. If walking to school, avoid hitchhiking and accepting rides from strangers. Avoid deserted areas and always walk facing traffic.
5. Stay in touch with campus news. Check your campus e-mail account at least weekly to see if there are any current safety incident reports to review. The University Web site, the Emergency Information Web site and your campus e-mail account are the primary ways the University communicates safety related information to students.
6. If you have children, never leave them unattended in University lounges or labs. The University does not have child care facilities at any of its campus locations.
7. Take a moment to report any unsafe conditions to [campussafety@uhv.edu](mailto:campussafety@uhv.edu).

If you are an employee...

1. Know your co-workers and be familiar with the people that should be in your area. Don't be shy...question activity or behavior that seems unusual;
2. Be familiar with work safety policies and procedures;
3. Introduce yourself to the security personnel and know how to reach them;
4. Develop an office alert procedure (a simple signal) with co-workers to let each other know when one is in trouble
5. Do not loan your office keys to anyone who is not an employee;
6. Be very cautious about providing personal information, such as your SSN over the telephone or internet;
7. If working late, lock your exterior office doors and be cautious about who you let in after hours;
8. Leave your office blinds open so security and others can easily see inside as they make their rounds;
9. Report safety related issues, such as non-working lights right away;
10. If you are leaving late and you are concerned about personal safety, walk with a co-worker or ask security for an escort;
11. Get into the habit of locking valuables in your desk drawer;
12. Do not carry an unnecessary number of credit cards. For the cards you carry, keep the card information in another place should they be stolen.

## Campus Crime and Security Report

### Reporting of Crimes

The University strongly encourages individuals and organizations to promptly report crimes and emergencies that occur either on campus or off-campus to the police department having jurisdiction. At the UHV Campus, crimes should also be reported to either Campus Security ([securityofficer@uhv.edu](mailto:securityofficer@uhv.edu)), telephone (361) 570-4830, or the UHV Campus Safety and Risk Manager at (361) 570-4245. At UHS at Cinco Ranch report crimes to the Security Office, (832) 842-2877 and at UHS at Sugar Land report crimes to the Security Office, (281) 275-3302. The Cinco Ranch Security Office and the Sugar Land Security Office will also report the crime to the UHDPs Police Department. Campus Security personnel will ensure that crimes reported directly to the University are also reported to the police department having jurisdiction. Victims reporting crimes to the University are encouraged to file a police report of the incident where it will be assigned a case number and officially investigated. If a suspect is identified, the case can be referred to the District Attorney's Office and that office will decide if there is enough evidence to prosecute. Each criminal violation is considered one offense for statistical reporting.

### Security and Access to Campus Buildings

The University of Houston-Victoria is a state institution of higher education and as such, the campus is open to the public. However, the University reserves the right to bar or evict individuals who are considered a threat to the well-being of the campus community or have no legitimate purpose for being on campus. Each building has separate office and building hours that are clearly posted at each main entrance. Generally, office hours are from 8:00 a.m.-5:00 p.m., Monday-Friday. Evening and weekend access is limited to facilities in which computer labs, library services, or other resources are open to students. Building hours vary by facility depending on the services provided but most facilities close by 10:00 p.m. on weekdays and 6:00 p.m. on weekends. University officials and Campus Security have the authority to ask for identification. Students and employees must cooperate and present their photo ID if asked. Individuals who do not have a legitimate purpose for being on campus can be asked to leave and if they do not cooperate may be issued a criminal trespass citation. Campus Security locks all entrances after normal building closure hours.

### Timely Warning, Notice And Access to Information

The University will provide timely warnings to the campus community about crimes that pose an ongoing threat to students and employees. When there is knowledge of an ongoing threat, an informational notice will be reported to students and employees. Electronic mail is the primary method of University communication and each employee and currently enrolled student has a University assigned e-mail account. For this reason, students and employees are reminded and strongly encouraged to check their University e-mail account at least once weekly for news or notices.

The University also maintains a public crime log, which contains a record of all incidents reported to Campus Security or to the Campus Safety Office. The UHV Campus public crime log includes a record of all crimes and reports of other safety or risk related incidents...not just those required in this annual report. For example, crimes like theft would be included in the public crime log. Minimally, the public crime log is required to include the "nature, date, time, and general location of each crime" as well as its disposition if known. Incidents are required to be recorded within two business days but certain information may be withheld to protect victim privacy or to ensure the integrity of ongoing investigations. The UHV public crime log is available in the Business Services Department, Suite 107, in the University West Building. The public crime log, which remains open for at least 60 days, is available during normal business hours (8:00 a.m.-5:00 p.m., Monday-Friday) to students, employees and the general public.

### Voluntary, Confidential Reporting of Crimes

The University's policy regarding the confidential reporting of crimes is to protect the identity of those reporting crimes to the extent that the law allows. Anonymous reports may not be accepted unless the information can be substantiated by means other than the caller's veracity.

Employees and students of the University may report allegations of fraud, waste or other regulatory compliance issues anonymously and confidentially from any computer or phone. Reports may be made either online by visiting the MySafe Campus Web site (<http://www.mysafecampus.com>) or by calling 1-800-716-9007. You may also use MySafe Campus to report concerns regarding employee or student behavior under the "Campus Safety/Security Concerns" section. The University will respond to all reports.

### Enforcement Authority of Campus Security Officers

All University campuses have a campus security office staffed by Security Officers from the UHDPS Police Department. Campus Security staff have a working relationship with local law enforcement agencies. The local Police Departments will respond to calls for emergency assistance. Security Officers have the right to require identification of any person on the property. Also, in accordance with state law, no person may refuse or fail to leave a building under the control of the University during those hours when the building is regularly closed to the public. Campus Security personnel at University campuses will summon local law enforcement, emergency response personnel or University officials as warranted by the situation. UHDPS Security Officers do not have the authority to execute an arrest or issue a criminal citation. Comments concerning Campus Security at University campuses should be directed to the UHV Campus Safety and Risk Manager at (361) 570-4245.

### Monitoring & Recording Off-Campus Student Activities

The University strongly encourages individuals and organizations to promptly report crimes that occur at noncampus sites to the law enforcement agency having jurisdiction as well as Campus Security at the noncampus site for the purpose of warning the University community and for inclusion in the annual security report. UHDPS Security Officers are assigned to both UHS at Cinco Ranch and UHS at Sugar Land. Should you need assistance concerning safety or security matters at either UHS at Cinco Ranch or UHS at Sugar Land, contact the Security Officer on duty or request assistance from Administrative personnel. In an emergency situation, the University recommends that you call 911 for immediate Emergency Assistance and then notify the Security Officer or Administrative personnel as soon as possible.

### Enforcement Authority (as Cited in the Texas Education Code)

**Refusing or Failing to Leave Building Closed to Public-Section 51.242, Texas Education Code:** “No person may refuse or fail to leave a building under the control and management of a public agency, including a state-supported institution of higher education, during those hours of the day or night when the building is regularly closed to the public. Upon being requested to do so by a guard, watchman, or other employee of a public agency, including a state-supported institution of higher education, controlling and managing the building or property, if the surrounding circumstances are such as to indicate to a reasonable person that the individual or individuals have no apparent lawful business to pursue.”

**Unauthorized Person Refusal of Entry, Ejection, Identification-Section 51.209, Texas Education Code:** “The governing board of a state institution of higher education or its authorized representatives may refuse to allow persons having no legitimate business to enter on property under the board's control, and may eject any undesirable person from the property on his refusal to leave peaceably on request. Identification may be required of any person on the property.”

**Trespass, Damage, Etc. - Section 51.204, Texas Education Code:** “It is unlawful for any person to trespass on the grounds of any state institution of higher education of this state or to damage or deface any of the buildings, statues, monuments, memorials, trees, shrubs, grasses, or flowers on the grounds of any state institution of higher education.”

## Security Considerations in the Maintenance of Facilities and Grounds

The Facilities Services Department is the service unit primarily responsible for maintaining facilities and grounds. Students and employees are encouraged to report maintenance concerns or issues such as non-operational lights, improperly locking doors, elevator problems, etc. as well as other safety or security hazards. On the UHV Campus, maintenance concerns may be reported several ways: (1) Call Facilities Services (361) 570-4840; (2) submit an online [UHV Facilities Service Request](#); or (3) email Campus Security at [securityofficer@uhv.edu](mailto:securityofficer@uhv.edu) and security will forward the request. For UHS at Cinco Ranch and UHS at Sugar Land maintenance concerns or issues, you may (1) complete a [Facilities Work Order](#) or (2) contact the Building Maintenance Manager at (281) 275-3304 or [sprinklej@uhv.edu](mailto:sprinklej@uhv.edu). Contact the UHV Director of Facilities Services at (361) 570-4840 or email [rulandm@uhv.edu](mailto:rulandm@uhv.edu) if your maintenance concern or issue is not resolved in a timely manner.

### Sexual Assault

The University is committed to providing a safe and secure campus environment and it is important to note that there have been no known reports of sexual assault at UHV, UHS at Cinco Ranch or UHS at Sugar Land. However, if you are the victim of a sexual assault:

#### Get medical care....

As soon as possible, get medical care from a hospital emergency room or your primary care physician. Do not bathe, shower, douche or change clothes prior to your medical examination. Doing so could destroy evidence which may not be legally acceptable if collected later than 72 hours after the assault. If you have already removed clothes worn at the time of the assault, put them in a plastic bag and take them with you to the ER. An examination by a rape/sexual assault nurse will usually be advised to collect information for documentation of evidence should the case be prosecuted. The examination may also include testing and treatment to help prevent sexually transmitted diseases.

#### Report the assault....

It is your decision whether to report the sexual assault to law enforcement; however, consider that your report may prevent assaults to others. If you plan to file a police report, do not clean up the area or alter it in any way prior to police arrival. All information and reports of sexual assault will be kept confidential to the extent allowed by law. In accordance with the Texas Code of Criminal Procedures, Article, 57, victims may use a pseudonym to protect their identity. The pseudonym is simply a set of initials or any fictitious name chosen by the victim, which will be used in all public files and records concerning the assault.

The University will consider, at the victim's request, changing the victim's academic situation, if reasonable.

- Talk with the UHV Student Services Office, (361) 570-4135, about counseling referrals or other assistance that might be available.
- Call or visit the United Campus Ministry organization located at 3310 North Ben Jordan, (361) 649-2904, which offers multi-denominational pastoral counseling for any student in need.

### Disciplinary Procedures and Sanctions

If the offender is a student, he or she will be subject to the due processes of University policy for their respective home campus regardless of any civil or criminal action that may be pending as a result of the violation. All disciplinary hearings will adhere to the procedures for notification, evidence, counsel/advisors, burden of proof, records, findings, and appeals as outlined in the home campus Student Handbook. University sanctions may include but are not limited to probation, mandatory participation in specific awareness or rehabilitation programs and/or suspension or expulsion from the University. In all hearings, both the accused and accuser will have the same opportunities to present their version of the facts. They can also present other evidence in support of the case including witnesses, and they may question evidence presented. A student's right to privacy is lost when accused of sexual assault on campus and both the victim and the accused will be informed of the outcome of any disciplinary proceedings. Again, the outcome of a hearing is the home University's final determination with respect to the alleged sex offense and sanctions that are imposed and does not address other civil or criminal actions against the accused.

### University Response to Crime Reports

If a violent crime or any other crime that poses an ongoing danger to the University community occurs, efforts will be made to report the information immediately to appropriate administrators, employees, and all currently enrolled students. A monthly summary of safety and risk related incidents from the UHV Campus, the adjacent Victoria College Campus, UHS at Cinco Ranch, and UHS at Sugar Land are reported to all employees and students by e-mail. This information is also posted on the respective campus Safety Office bulletin boards. Incidents and criminal offenses are also brought to the attention of the campus Safety and Risk Advisory Committee which meets quarterly. Representatives from the UHV, UHS at Cinco Ranch and UHS at Sugar Land participate on the committee. Monthly incidents can be viewed online at [UHV Campus Safety Incident Log](#).

## Emergency Assistance Telephones

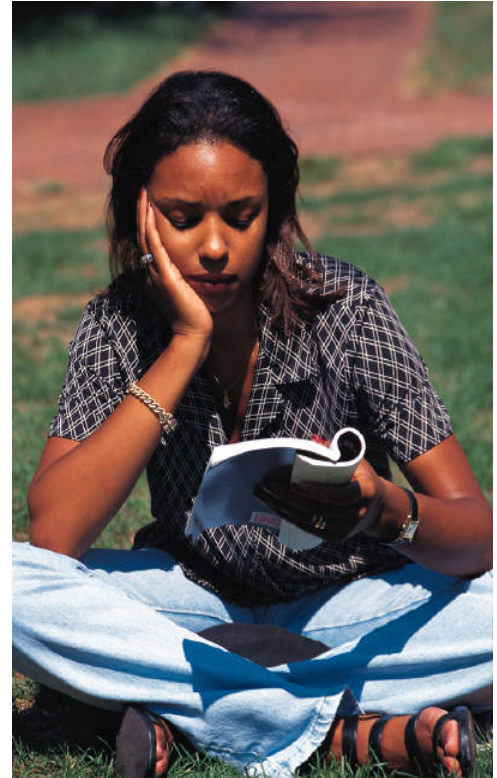
The University has a number of emergency assistance telephones at the UHV Campus. One emergency assistance phone is located on the grounds near the west entrance to the University Center building. Another emergency assistance phone is located on the grounds near the east entrance to the University West building. Emergency Assistance phones are installed in all campus building elevators. Emergency assistance phones are routinely checked for proper operation and none of the emergency assistance phones require coins to operate.

At UHS at Sugar Land, there are several emergency phones located prominently on the campus property.

## Educational Programs

Throughout the academic year, the University may offer a variety of educational sessions on topics such as sexual assault prevention, campus safety, campus security, campus risk management program, dealing with aggressive behavior, sexual harassment, personal safety, holiday safety, hurricane awareness and other safety related programs. 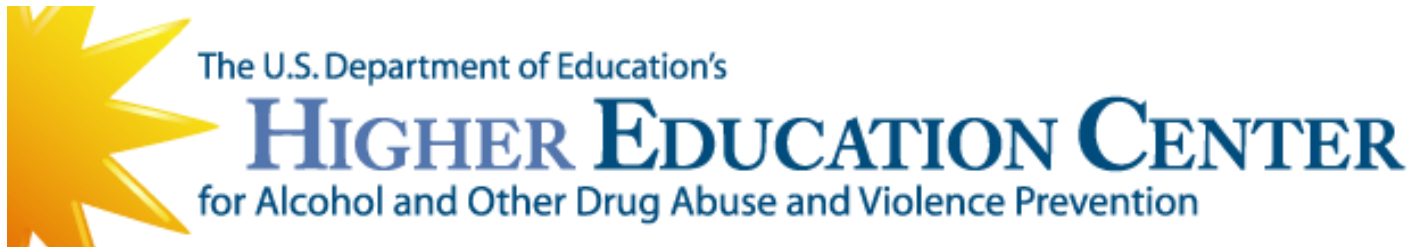
## PIER System (Public Information & Emergency Response)

The University of Houston-Victoria utilizes the Public Information and Emergency Response (PIER) System to manage critical communication during an emergency event. PIER is an on-demand crisis management communication web-application. The PIER system is designed for external and internal communication applications where speed, efficiency, and direct communication are important. PIER puts all critical tools needed by communicators into a single, easy-to-use communication platform. Push, pull and interactive communication are all managed in a highly efficient and tightly integrated manner. Communicators and an extended team can work together from anywhere at any time to fully complete and manage a wide range of critical communication tasks.

### The Clery Act Drug-Free Schools and Communities Act (DFSCA) Drug and Alcohol Abuse Prevention Regulations



The U.S. Department of Education has enacted two mandates that require virtually all institutions of higher education (IHEs) to provide documentation that they have dedicated resources to crime prevention and alcohol and other drug (AOD) abuse prevention:

- [The Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act \(Clery Act\)](#) requires IHEs to disclose information about crime on their campuses and in the surrounding communities. IHEs that do not comply with the Clery Act may face fines and be suspended from participating in the federal financial aid program.
- [The Drug-Free Schools and Communities Act \(DFSCA\) and Drug and Alcohol Abuse Prevention Regulations](#) require campuses to certify that they have adopted and implemented programming to prevent the unlawful possession, use, or distribution of illicit drugs and alcohol by students and employees. Failure to comply with DFSCA puts IHEs at risk of forfeiting their federal funding eligibility.

The illegal use of drugs and alcohol is inconsistent with the behavior expected of members of the University community. The University is committed to the development and maintenance of an environment free of alcohol and drug abuse and in compliance with the Drug Free Workplace Act of 1988 and the Drug Free Schools and Communities Act of 1989. These laws and their accompanying regulations provide a proper framework for the anti-drug and anti-alcohol policies of the University.

As an IHE, the University of Houston-Victoria must comply with the **Drug-Free Schools and Communities Act (DFSCA) and Drug and Alcohol Abuse Prevention Regulations**. Please review UHV Administrative Policy [C-19, Drug and Alcohol Abuse Prevention](#) which includes a description of drug and alcohol-abuse education programs. Include in the policy are the very serious consequences for illegal drug and alcohol use, including the Penalties under Federal Law and Texas Law. Review the information on the [Effects of Drugs Use](#) and the [Health Risks of Alcohol and Drugs](#) associated with the use of illicit drugs and the abuse of alcohol. Review the mandated biennial [Alcohol and Other Drug \(AOD\) Report](#) which highlights the substance abuse prevention education efforts of the university.

It is the policy of the University that **illicit drug use** including their manufacture, sale, distribution, dispensation or possession is **prohibited** in the workplace, on the campus, or as part of any University activity. Consumption of alcohol may be permitted at certain pre-approved University events subject to UHV Administrative Policy [A-41, Alcoholic Beverage Use on Campus](#) and compliance with local, state and federal laws.

### The Victoria College Clery Act Report and Crime Statistics

*The University of Houston-Victoria and The Victoria College are separate educational institutions whose campuses border with no perceptible boundaries. The Victoria College has its own Department of Police and Campus Safety Office. It is recommended that UHV Faculty, Staff and students review The Victoria College Clery Act report and crime statistics since many employees and students routinely use various VC facilities and services including the VC/UHV Library, VC Auditorium, VC Bookstore, VC Sports Center and shared parking lots. ### Crime Statistics for Non-Campus Buildings or Properties

A non-campus building or property is defined as: (1) Any building or property owned or controlled by a student organization that is officially recognized by the institution; or (2) Any building or property owned or controlled by an institution that is used in direct support of, or in relation to the institution's educational purposes, is frequently used by students, and is not within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area of the institution. The University of Houston-Victoria has employees and students at UHS at Cinco Ranch and UHS at Sugar Land. Crime statistics for UHS at Cinco Ranch and UHS at Sugar Land are reported separately in the Campus Crime and Security Report.
